# Background

Originating miles away in Wuhan city in the Republic of China, the highly infectious Covid-19 virus forced countries across the world to close borders and halt movement. On 31st-March-2020, Uganda announced its first coronavirus case. The news sent a wave of panic across the country and resulted in a national lockdown.

The lockdown restricted all public transport and private cars from moving, except for traveling essential workers. A curfew was introduced; schools were closed; large gatherings prohibited and shopping places closed – except those selling food. Restricted movement is the best means to limit the spread of the virus, but this resulted in the majority of the Ugandan population being left in a dire economic state.

The effects of the loss of income and economic activity were felt into August 2020, even after the lockdown eased. The informal sector in Uganda that accounts for about 80% of the country's workforce, was hardest hit as the restrictions on work meant that many families went hungry.

This report is a deliberate effort by CivSource Africa to capture the spirit of giving and community that happened during this time when Ugandans could not work - and therefore many could not eat. This here, is proof that African Philanthropy exists and thrives even when in moments of deep crisis. This report documents for the third time, the giving and acts of Ubuntu that took place in this season, in response to the need of the times.



## Chapter 1

# Philanthropy By The Business Community

In the first phase of the lockdown, the private sector focused their giving directly to the National COVID-19 Taskforce, as recorded in CivSource's Volume 1 of, "Generosity During COVID-19". In Volume Two, most of the giving recorded was done directly to those in dire need across the country. In this Volume, however, we notice that the private sector has gone public with its philanthropic acts of giving and made it their CSR projects in response to the pandemic crisis.

For example, Stanbic Bank-Uganda purchased food items worth UGX 140million (about \$38,000) for the vulnerable communities affected by the lockdown, besides its initial UGX 100million (about \$27,000) initially donated to the OPM. This was done throughout the country reaching up to 4,000 individuals in vulnerable communities. Besides the relief food items,

the bank also provided 1000 prepaid phone sim-cards to organizations and health partners to facilitate cashless payments to frontline staff and other essential workers.

The cards were issued to the Uganda Virus Research Institute (UVRI), Infectious Disease Institute (IDI), Infectious Disease Research Collaboration (IDRC), and African Initiatives for Relief and Development (AIRD). This is a deliberate move by the bank to help prevent the spread of the virus through contact, by eliminating the exchange of cash notes.

This season's most notable recipients recorded in the acts of giving are the Loving Hearts Babies Home and Munyonyo Children's Home by Stanbic Bank. Ms Barbara Kasekende, the Corporate Social Investments Manager, acknowledged the hard realities of the most vulnerable in communities like these two children's homes that were under

great constraints to operate on a day to day basis.

Letshego Holdings Ltd, under its subsidiary Letshego Uganda donated a consignment of goods worth UGX 4million (over \$1000) to Kyotera town as contribution to the district's efforts in managing the impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

Speaking to the press, Giles Aijukwe, the CEO for Letshego said during times of uncertainty and crisis, one cannot emphasize enough the need to support one another, and how unity brings collective strength. With individual sources of income being lost and businesses closing, unemployment is at its worst. Letshego therefore could not pass the opportunity to partner with an initiative that is already taking strides in bettering their community.





## Blood Donation

With the shortages at the blood-bank, the private sector stepped in to help. Africell Uganda gave the Uganda Blood Transfusion Services (UBTS) a communication package to aid their activities against COVID-19.

The goal was to facilitate communication among key staff in the different branches across the country at a time when movement was heavily restricted due to COVID-19 lockdown measures. Speaking to the media, Edgar Karamagi, the Africell Spokesperson, revealed that the package comprised 3 toll-free lines, 5 phones with 700 minutes

of talk-time plus 5GB of data each, and routers loaded with data to guarantee connectivity at the Blood Bank is accessible and stable during the pandemic. The Blood Transfusion Services are intentional about providing a continued service to those in crisis and in need of blood, by closing the gap that exists between the community and the service center. The complete communication package will enable people to be reached, as well as enable the public have to access these free services.

Advertising the blood drives has been extensively done via the digital footprint with campaigns directly managed

by the telecom's marketing and communication experts.

Mr. Michael Mukundane, the Public Relations Officer of UBTS, welcomed the help as it addresses the urgent need for fresh blood from voluntary donors, for recipients that require blood transfusions; among others - those that are severely anaemic, that include mothers, accident victims, children, sickle cell and cancer patients. He praised Africell for enhancing their communication as it would enable and support the continuous flow of blood donation by extending the donor pool as far as the campaigns reach.





## A Million Condoms

DKT Uganda, the makers of KISS and Fiesta Condom brands, and Dembe Group donated one million condoms worth \$50,000 to the Ministry of Health. This was a reminder of the importance of reproductive health amidst the pandemic.

While receiving the donation, the Health Minister, Dr. Ruth Aceng stated how the cases of sexual abuse have increased

countrywide during the pandemic since most of the children are out of school.

Speaking to the press, the Chief Executive Officer Anil Damani, explained how Dembe Group came up with the initiative to reduce unwanted pregnancies during the lockdown.

In as much as Uganda has safeguarded the population

from the rapid spread of COVID-19, sexual activity among teenagers has increased the occurrence of STDs and teenage pregnancies.

The donation could not have come at a better time, given that up to 2,300 teenagers got pregnant during the lockdown.





## Commercial Farmers Donate

When Esther Baroma, the Mukono District Women's League Chairperson reported that people were going to bed hungry, the district dairy farmers responded. The Mukono district chairman, Andrew Ssenyonga led the team that distributed the milk to the patients and their attendants at Mukono General Hospital.

Ssenyonga said they decided to distribute 200 liters of milk to different health units daily, bringing the amount of milk distributed to over 3,000 liters. The small-scale farmers continued to share with neighbours and the large-scale farmers donated on a bigger scope, some going all the way to the national level. While many did it as individuals, the coffee farmers mobilized themselves and donated as a group. In the spirit of standing together

with the government, the Uganda Coffee Development Authority (UCDA) mobilized the stakeholders in the coffee industry to donate food and other essential items for the vulnerable and poor who survive on daily earnings. The current lockdown limited the earning of many, and many still go without food.

Led by Hon. Vincent Sempijja, the Minister of Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries, the farmers handed over several items to the head of the task force, Hon. Mary Karooro Okurut. The items included a total of UGX 142.8 million (About \$39,000) in cash and two brand new pickup trucks. In addition to that, the Uganda Coffee Development Authority contributed 2,000 packs of ground Uganda coffee for the frontline staff in the fight

against the pandemic. The Neuman Gruppe, (that own the Kaweri Coffee Plantation that is the largest coffee plantation in Uganda), donated relief food items directly to some districts, as well as donating UGX 15million (about \$4,000) to the National Taskforce. They gave 5 tons of beans and 7 tons of maize to the RDC's office in Mubende District and to Ankole Coffee Producers Co-op Union Ltd (ACPCU) located in Sheema district in South Western Uganda.

An additional UGX 12 million (\$3,200) was given for fuel to take women in labour to hospital in the districts of Shema, Bushenyi, Mitooma, Rubirizi, Rwampara, Buhweju, Ibanda, Kiruhura, Mbarara, Ntungamo and Kazo, where the cooperative buys coffee.





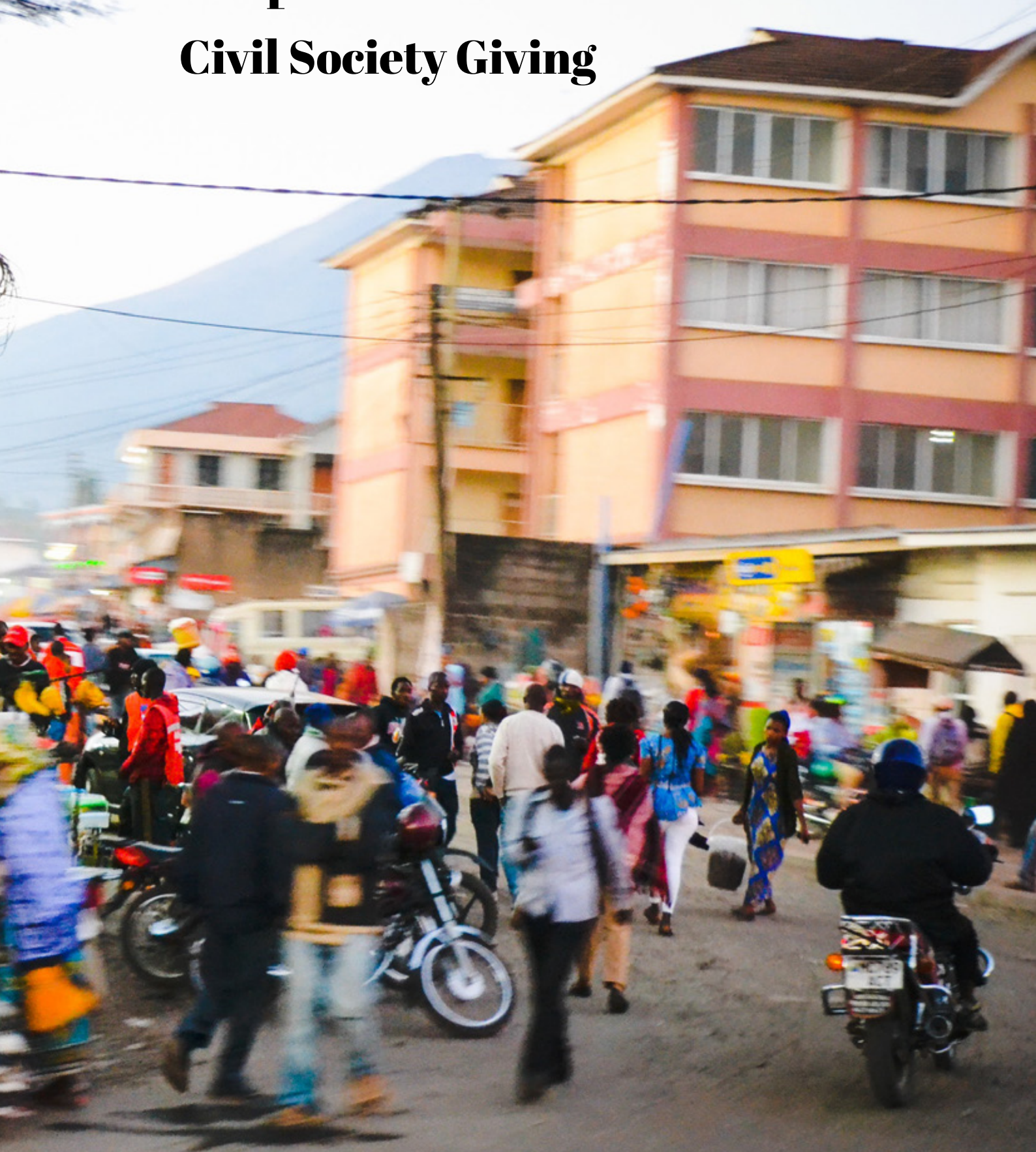

# Chapter 2

## Civil Society Giving





The response from national and international non-profits has been matchless. Without a given budget for the pandemic, a sense of obligation to find and create ways and means to meet needs that went beyond any budget possible, has been the most recent evidence of what philanthropy is all about in the 21st Century.

Through the National Non-Governmental Organizations Forum (NGO-Forum) that includes Community Service (CBO's) civil society organizations did the following:

- I. CSOs contributed expertise in emergency response.
- II. CSOs contributed expertise in community mobilization and sensitization, psychosocial support, child friendly approaches in emergency, gender and disability approaches

to emergency response and several other social dimensions.

III. CSOs brought their logistical expertise in areas like food distribution to establish a voucher that is effective system in emergency.

IV. CSOs monitored and documented the lessons emerging from the emergency period for purposes of learning and building strong response practices for the future including the post-Covid-19 period.

V. CSOs did not request resources or funding from Government in the emergency phase but instead worked with their donors to channel initially approved programmatic funds towards emergency response wherever possible, as their contribution to the emergency response in the Covid-19 fight.

## Work Begins

CSOs provided a formidable buttress for the response to humanitarian need during the pandemic in Uganda. For example, when deaths from the coronavirus were associated with pre-existing health conditions by the WHO, Sanctuary Medical Foundation, a Not-for-Profit organization, known for its work in Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs), quickly launched a fundraising drive to prevent deaths among patients by providing health service support and screening, as well as health awareness on the virus.

Their focus was on ensuring that those with pre-existing conditions were in good health, and were not exposed to possible infection, through health promotion and safety and social practices, that would protect them against being infected by the coronavirus.

The organization runs free medical camps around the country screening for NCDs, and endeavors to provide subsidized medical care for patients. However, the organization is short of funds to run the necessary tests and to provide the required medication. Their goal is to ensure proper management of patients with NCDs if they are infected by the

coronavirus.

Due to the uncertainty and financial strain of the lockdown period, the aim is to raise money for patients under our care to be able to access their medication for the next six months," they explained.

A call was made for individuals willing to help patients who found themselves having to choose between food and medication during the lockdown.

Many of the Foundation's patients are hypertensive, diabetic, and sometimes both. They need medication that will be subsidized to UGX 10,000 (about \$3) per month as opposed to nearly UGX 200,000 (\$54) that they would have spent.

They ended by emphasizing the fact that unlike the general belief, Non-Communicable Diseases affect the less fortunate just as much as they do the rich. Sadly, for the less fortunate, should COVID-19 strike, it might find them unable to fend off the disease known to kill those battling poor health.





## A Contactless Soap Dispenser for Crowded Places

In a bid to curb the spread of COVID-19, a group of youth innovated a contactless soap dispenser. Sustainable Youth Development Foundation (SYDF), a community-based organization, specifically targeted its innovation to crowded slums and rural communities. They believed that in these places, where many share a piece of soap, chances of infection while sanitizing are high.

The organization's dispenser prototype helps limit theft of soap in these crowded places. They mount different sizes of liquid soap containers onto handwashing stations by either welding or using screws.

Their target is to see their innovation, dubbed Naomi Hand Wash and Liquid Soap, taken to the crowded Mpererwe Market. They committed to producing at least 200 liters of liquid soap to donate to the market, as well.

The organization is looking to start a nationwide drive to encourage contactless

soap dispensing in crowded places. "Financial support is needed to enable us to produce more dispensers for different communities, especially the rural ones and border districts of Uganda," they said.

They maintain that their commitment is towards helping communities beat pandemics like COVID-19, by ensuring better preparation. They have since carried out hands-on skilling of the youth on hygiene and soap making.

While doing this, the Foundation which advocates for clean environmental practices, uses the chance to sensitize the community on environmental issues.

"A true social entrepreneur is one who can think and work through the unexpected, do something positive about the present situation, and plan and work towards the future," they said.





## Protecting the Rolex Vendor from COVID-19

As the country returns to a new normal, the need to protect street food vendors against the deadly coronavirus grows. With this in mind, Rolex Initiative, the philanthropic arm of the Rolex Festival, has rolled out a philanthropic drive to that effect.

The organization gets its name from the rolex, a popular Ugandan street food that is typically an egg omelette and vegetables wrapped in pan-fried chapati.

To transform the informal sector to the formal, the organization's first stride will be hygienic meal preparation and skills training. "One of our strong objectives is to empower, equip and promote healthier meal preparation amongst rolex makers," they explained. "We continue to move around the city during this uncertain period to advocate for the safety performance of rolex makers to fight COVID-19."

In these COVID-19 times, their campaign dubbed, Our Safe Street Food involves equipping rolex vendors with the essentials like reusable face masks, aprons, chef hats, and

soap. While donating the items, there will be information about the coronavirus passed on to each recipient.

"We understand that rolex vendors remain at the forefront of providing meals to the population because food is an essential human right. We are therefore gathering more support to reach as many numbers as possible; your favorite meal shouldn't be served at the expense of a life."

To ensure even more vendors are reached, the organization rolled out a fundraising drive that calls on many to join this pertinent cause. "We are looking for support in the form of products and cash to allow us to acquire all the essentials to equip this sector of the economy" they said.

Note that on top of the philanthropic act, the initiative is also looking to use improved chapati making machines to reduce hand contact with food. They believe that this will help prevent infectious diseases like coronavirus.





## Food for 300 Families in Mityana District

A group of philanthropists came together to fundraise for the hungry in Mityana District. Through their organisation called Mityana Charity, the philanthropists called on friends both here and abroad to join in their campaign to feed at least 300 families.

“These lockdowns are necessary measures to contain the spread of COVID-19 and they have proved successful in many countries. However, they have presented economic interruptions which are unprecedented in many ways and require state and other partners to support vulnerable households economically and medically,” they elucidated.

They further explained that because of the lockdowns, the economy experienced a downward trend. Prices of food and non-food items has hiked and there is loss of employment, and closure of many companies.

“Small businesses run by low-income earners cannot operate (e.g. salon operators, boda-boda riders, market vendors, and taxi drivers) so they have had no income for about two months,” they said.

Sadly, many of the affected people are single mothers and elderly grandmothers. “With schools now closed, all children are at home thereby increasing the challenges of providing household necessities and food.

Those that could previously afford one meal a day, are now struggling to find anything to eat,” they explained. Before the decision to help the families, some of the mothers had already started reaching out for support to buy maize flour and beans to enable their families to survive.

They appealed to friends to raise funds to buy at least 6,120kgs of maize flour and 3,200kgs of beans to benefit over 300 households as they get through these very difficult times.

“Indeed, if we do not respond to the cry of God’s people, they may face many more health challenges as a result of COVID-19. Let us together scale up the fight against COVID-19 by supporting the livelihood of the people in most need,” they said.





## A New Roof for Singiro Public School

In the thick of the lockdown, heavy winds blew the roof off a classroom block at Singiro Public School in Kyazanga Town Council. Sadly, this was the only permanent structure in a school that serves a large section of the Singiro community.

The date may not be known yet but should the Ministry of Education announce the re-opening of schools, the pupils in this school will not have a classroom.

With this in mind, Singiro Village Hope for Orphans (SVHO), a community-based organization, mobilized the community and church to start fundraising for a structure. They did this because the distance to the closest school would lead to school dropouts in the community.

“Where will the pupils have lessons from since our permanent building is down?” the organization paused the question that began the fundraising drive.

They quickly made an official plea: “It’s,

therefore, our humble request to all well-wishers to donate to this noble cause.” As the community joined the fundraising, the organization reached out to those far and beyond.

They suggested that another modest structure be built at a total cost of UGX 55.727 million (about \$16,000). “You can reach Singiro Village Hope for Orphans bank account at DFCU Lyantonde branch Uganda. The account name is Singiro Village Hope for Orphans, and the account number is 01641115729483.”

Progress has been made as works are currently on-going in the school. A structure has been built and is now awaiting plastering of the walls and floors. The organization hopes to be done with the building by the time schools re-open.

“We would like to thank all of you who supported us, brothers, sisters, friends, and well-wishers. Your financial support has enabled us to reach this stage,” they celebrated.



## **Chapter 3**

# **Giving By Alumni Associations And Communities**





When Innocent Ndiko, first reached out to her former classmates at Nakasero Primary School, Class of 1983, she didn't know what to expect. "I found out that the lockdown had been hard on them; some people had lost jobs!

They were in really terrible places in life, it was bad," she recalls. Ndiko knew that she had to do something. She immediately reached out to the other classmates through their WhatsApp group and asked if they could raise some food for those who had nothing to eat. They did. "We raised UGX 3million (about \$800). It was sent to those who openly said they needed help," she says.

Even if the distribution of help was private, the reactions somehow went public when people returned to the group to say thank you. "My heart was touched; looking at those messages of gratitude made me cry, I knew I had to do more for people," she narrates.



## Gayaza Old Girls Fundraise

Ndiko reached out to her classmates at Gayaza High School, Class of 1984. She asked if anyone was going through a hard time and needed help. This was different, the ladies from her former secondary school were not as forthcoming.

"I then called a teacher at the school and learned that all was not well. The things they were doing to surviving were tough," she recalls. "I returned to my classmates and asked if we could instead fundraise for the teachers that needed our help."

She also decided to reach out to the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) to see if more could

be collected. It was. "We raised over 12million (\$3,200) and it was given to the teachers at the school," she says.

Priority was given to teachers who were not on the government payroll and therefore had no source of income now that schools are closed. The class of 1984 raised about UGX 3Million (\$800).

Of this, 2 million was given to the teachers and 1million to former classmates who eventually reached out for help. An elated Ndiko again knew there more to be done.





## A Buddo Fundraising

“If the teachers at Gayaza were struggling, that means the ones in Buddo and several other schools were going through the same”. Ms Ndiko spoke of how the notion to extend the fundraising to King’s College Buddo was birthed.

“I sold the idea to the Buddo PTA Chairman and he agreed to it. We allowed ourselves a week to collect the money and raised over 8 million in five days,” she says. Just like with Gayaza, this money was given to teachers that are not on the government payroll.

According to Kalungi Kabuye, a journalist with Vision Group, when combined with what the PTA raised, Buddo old students and parents in different classes and years raised up to UGX 15million (\$4,000) during the lockdown.

Innocent Ndiko who sits on several boards believes more schools can do the same. “I hope Mwiri Boys’ School joins the fundraising for their teachers and fellow students,” she said.





## Communities

The Yemen Muslim Community living in the Eastern Region of Uganda fundraised and donated UGX 10million (\$2,700) to the National COVID Task force. While receiving the donation, Mary Karooro Okurut, the Minister for General Duties in the Office of the Prime Minister commended the community for being friends in need.

On his part, Hajji Ali Mahammad Mazrui and the vice-chairman Yemen Community in Uganda said that this was a time for everyone to become a philanthropist and that they were honored to be helping out a country that is hosting them. "This has been an honour. On behalf of the

Yemen communities in Eastern Region, it was our pleasure to give the little we have in this fight," Hajji Mazrui said.

The Turkish community in Uganda donated 50 bicycles to the National COVID-19 Taskforce. At the event, Kerem Alp, the head of the Turkish Community in Uganda said that the bicycles should be given to Kitgum and Sembabule districts.

"Majority of health workers in Sembabule and Kitgum hospitals do not have transport to work. We have therefore given 50 bicycles to help in their frontline fight against COVID-19," Alp said.





## Associations

A fundraising drive was launched by The Uganda Medical Association (UMA) to raise PPEs for the frontline workers. This was done through two initiatives; from the public and with a swipe-pay mobile payment facility.

Since the inception of the idea, UMA also revealed that they secured 175 million shillings worth of funding from the Open Society Initiative in Eastern Africa, which they used to buy PPEs. They distributed the PPEs through their 14 branches countrywide, as a way of supporting the national COVID-19 response.

PPE has been a major challenge in the global

fight against COVID-19, with health workers all over the world expressing their dissatisfaction at the failure by their governments to provide adequate PPE, thereby putting their lives at risk. On the political front, the National Resistance Movement youth pressure group dubbed "Generation 7" donated 8,000 sanitary pads to teenage girls in Kasese Districts.

While donating the pads worth UGX 3.8million (about \$1,000), the chairperson, Gilbert Olinga said that majority of the girls have been affected by both the lockdown and floods and would need pads.



## Chapter 4

# Giving by Individuals





## Young Girl Re-United With Family

While driving back home one evening, Don Innocent Wanyama, a Senior Presidential Press Secretary, found a teenage girl called Laetitia stranded in Naalya, a suburb in Kampala. The distressed young girl, aged between 13-15 years, was seated by the roadside. Concerned, he stopped and asked if she was okay. She was not.

"I am stranded. I was working as a house help for a woman in Ntinda. Three days ago, she threw me out of her house. I have been staying in the cold these three days and nights," the girl narrated.

Her English was not perfect, but upon digging further, he learned that her Lusamia (a dialect spoken in parts of Eastern Uganda) was good. Her account thereon left him nearly depressed.

"Someone came to her village in Namayingo a couple of months back, seeking for a house help to work for someone in Kampala," he recounted.

Sadly, Laetitia had gone months without pay and did not have a shilling to show for the time spent working. She had instead been thrown out in the cold at a time when the country had

stringent curfew times.

"Whereas she had a phone, she didn't have her boss' number, her parent's number and neither did she have that of the lady who picked her up from Namayingo District.

Before he could do anything, Don needed to confirm her story, which he did. A person in the neighbourhood who had been watching her confirmed her story of three days scavenging in that area.

"So, what do you want? How can I be of help?" he asked her. "I just want to get back home, to my parents," she answered, sobbing as she clasped a dirty polythene bag, which held all her "property".

It was getting late, past 6pm to be specific, and Don didn't know what to do to help the young girl. Almost instantly, a thought crossed his mind.

"My good friend Moses Oguttu knows the entire Samia landscape like the back of his hand," he thought. Lucky for the young girl, Don's friend, Oguttu had a solution.

"No, that's sad," a concerned Oguttu responded when he

heard the story. Quickly, he offered to help: "Bring her to my home in Lumuli, Seeta. Tomorrow, I will find a way of getting her to her village."

When Don got to Moses' house, he learned that Hon Mayende Dede, the Bukooli South MP, where Laetitia's village is located, had been contacted. Even better, the legislator had promised to pick Laetitia up since he was traveling the following day to Namayingo. He did.

"Hon Dede indeed picked Laetitia up from Oguttu's home and delivered her to Namayingo. He confirmed to us that Laetitia has been reunited with her family," an elated Don concluded his narration of the heartwarming act of giving.

It might have ended well, but Don could not fathom how cruel the world had been to the young girl. Despite that, he was glad that Laetitia got home safely.

"Allow me to thank my friend and brother Moses Oguttu and his wife," he began. "This guy has a heart of gold. He did not even think twice about sheltering Laetitia and helping get her back to her home. Thanks, Hon Dede for delivering the girl to her parents."







## Saving Teacher Lily

When Lydia Ajwang first made a plea to the public to save her paralyzed mother, she did not know what to expect. Her mother, Adongo Lily, a head teacher at Bata Secondary School, in Dokolo District, has a condition that causes paralysis. She needed individuals, to come to her mother's rescue and do it in just a week's time. Explaining the condition, she wrote:

It is a meningioma, a tumor in the spinal cord. Doctors say it is inactivating and re-activating her nerves and sensors, thus causing paralysis. She can no longer write, sit, walk or turn herself in bed,

however, the Doctors say there is a solution.

It involves first removing the tumor from the spinal cord through surgery. This will help in re-activating her nerves since the nerves will be free to move again; she will, therefore, be able to walk and do basic chores afresh.

The surgery costs UGX 23million (\$5,400) and this money needs to be raised in one week, which is by 28th July 2020. The

longer we wait the worse the condition gets. You can also save Lily by sending financial support to the following phone numbers.

Despite the financial strain caused by the lockdown in Uganda, in a few days, the public responded with over UGX 12million (about \$3,200) of the money needed for the surgery and the hospital agreed to operate.

"I feel so heavy-hearted, so burdened yet so loved, thanks to my virtual family. Thank you for the contributions," an elated Ajwang said. "Through you all, my mummy can walk again. Every cent counts."







## Twenty Thousand Books for Twenty Vulnerable Communities

As the country starts to ease the lockdown, philanthropist Lizza Kawooya is ensuring the young people are reading. “Due to the ongoing global pandemic, Uganda’s schools have been closed, leaving 15 million children without access to teachers, libraries, or online learning and friends,” she explains.

“Children, especially from vulnerable rural communities, are in complete isolation, in terms of continuous learning which now requires internet, televisions, and radio sets. Most families in these communities do not have these facilities.”

She says that this affected the

wellbeing of children and could also cause a risk in terms of discouraging of children from learning.

“It will eventually lead to increased learning inequality gaps and a high school drop rate in Uganda,” she says. “Our goal is to get books to children so that they can fall in love with reading and eventually read to learn. During this global pandemic, children need friends and encouragement, and a book can be that friend.”

Kawooya is, therefore, fundraising for up to 20,000 books and hopes to reach children in 20 vulnerable rural communities in the 4 regions of Uganda. She hopes that the

books will encourage them to keep reading and learning through this pandemic.

“You too can help us to get a book to a child at just UGX 10,000 (about \$3). Your gift of UGX 50,000 (about \$14) gives 5 books to 5 children, and they will be able to even share with their friends in the communities where they live,” she implored the public.

She ends by noting that books are just the friend a child needs for this lockdown. It is not known when schools will re-open as the government is still pondering the impact of this decision.





## A Studio to Help with Unemployment

Like it did in several countries, the lockdown caused the loss of jobs. In Uganda, the music and technology savvy, Kizebwana David Victor started a social enterprise that will provide a way forward for some of the recently unemployed youth.

He says that this is a time for reflection on what else the youth can do to survive.

"I have been graced with the opportunity to be a diversified skilled person not only in information technology but professional musical skills too. In a time like this, self-employment is the way to go if we are to survive

this," he says.

This is the notion that birthed a project he calls, The Integrity Sounds Uganda. This was initially aimed at improving music by setting up a music studio, then COVID-19 happened.

"The mission of this studio is to not only to produce music but also to provide employment opportunities to youths through production, receptionists, and the workforce team in the field," he stated. The studio also intends to implement training classes for the various skillsets therein. First, they will carry out hands-on skills training like piano playing and then move on to other skills like

deejaying. He says that this will help in upgrading the creativity level of the artistes in ensuring the quality of music produced. The goal is to grow this into a big and trustworthy social business that will provide even more jobs.

"In Uganda, most studios are set up and operate as home-based studios, but the Integrity Sounds studio is a business-oriented initiative with a long term goal of operating on a large scale, recording all kinds of music and discovering talents in every aspect of life," he further explained.





## Mbaali Now Has a Wheelchair

She urgently needed a wheelchair, anything to ease movement. With the philanthropy happening during the lockdown, Mtoka Mbaali decided to crowdsource. Through the online crowdfunding platform, Dolphin Fund, a fundraising drive was started on her behalf.

“My case is rather complex. I have been bedridden for 3 years. The little money I had saved was spent on medication, and never-ending electricity and water bills.

By the time COVID-19 crept in, my savings were already depleted, and my sons who were lending a hand lost their jobs,” she said. “If

someone can help me with a wheelchair, that would be my greatest relief,” she pleaded.

She said that though she needed help with the basics, a wheelchair would help reduce the weight of her problem and allow her to move. To buy the wheelchair, she needed seven-hundred thousand shillings, a sum that was raised on the platform in just a few weeks. Her plight touched many hearts and despite not knowing her, people donated almost instantly.

Dolphin Fund, a crowdfunding site that launched during the lockdown, celebrated every step

with Mbaali.

“On June 6th, 2020, a fundraiser to buy a wheelchair for 70-year-old Mtoka Mbaali, was launched on Dolphin Fund.

Ladies and gentlemen, at 100.14%, we are glad to report that in just 21 days, it is fully funded,” the Dolphin Fund team celebrated.

“A brand new wheelchair will be delivered to her within a few days. We take this opportunity to thank you for supporting this cause, for welcoming and trusting Dolphin Fund, where we fundraise for causes close to your heart. May God bless you.”





## Pastor Byaruhanga Feeds the Needy

Julius Byaruhanga, a pastor with Singiro's Independent Baptist Church in Kyazanga Town Council has been feeding the poor during the pandemic-induced lockdown. Not that he has much himself, but the preacher used his platform to make a plea to all and sundry to feed those in dire need. The response was positive, and though his target was to feed and clothe at least 500 people, he started at a good number.

He offered some basic needs packs to 55 needy children. The packs included clothes, food, sugar, soap, and cooking oil. Sadly, with every delivery that was made, the news reached many needy people in the

Western Ugandan District. "To our disappointment, the number that came was higher than those we had expected. In fact, the number doubled, it was a clear indication that there were many whom we did not reach," he said.

The man of God then pleaded with well-wishers to help: "I have witnessed people looking for food from composite pits. I have seen adults crying for food like beggars in my country Uganda. What you call trash may be of great importance to your brother or sister here."

The plea was heard by many

who helped him deliver food to families struggling to get even the day's meal.

"I am happy that through our fundraising, 75 families received 5kgs of maize, 3kgs of beans, a half a bar of soap and packet of salt. We pray that our benefactors receive God's continuous blessings," an elated Byaruhanga said.

Even as he fed the needy, Byaruhanga emphasized the need for hard work and savings for such tough times. He said that it is a good thing to believe in God's provision, but humans must also ensure that they have played their part too.



## **Chapter 5**

# **Giving To And By People With Disability**





## PWDS Demand Inclusion

When news of security forces shooting a man with hearing impairment broke on the 7th- April-2020, (<https://www.internationaldisabilityalliance.org/uganda-deaf-man>), it was just the wakeup call the country needed. Since then, there has been a reminder not to forget people with disabilities while battling the novel coronavirus.

People with disabilities (PWDs) have been at the forefront of fighting not to be forgotten. Advocacy has been their biggest tool in ensuring no one with a disability is left behind.

As a matter of fact, a Ugandan committee on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) has called for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in the strides to beat coronavirus.

Together with colleagues across the globe, the committee, largely made up of people with disabilities, asked the world to especially consider those battling psychosocial disability.

“Ensure continued access to support for people experiencing distress or unusual states of consciousness during the COVID-19 outbreak,” they urged UN member countries, Uganda included. “Step up efforts to develop a wide range of community-based services that respond to the needs of persons with psychosocial disabilities.

Respect people’s autonomy, choices, dignity, and privacy, including peer support and other alternatives to conventional mental health

services.”

Even as the world grapples with the virus, the committee urged governments to guarantee voluntary access to psychiatric drugs for those who want them. They also implored governments to allow back into the community, those who want a home-based treatment.

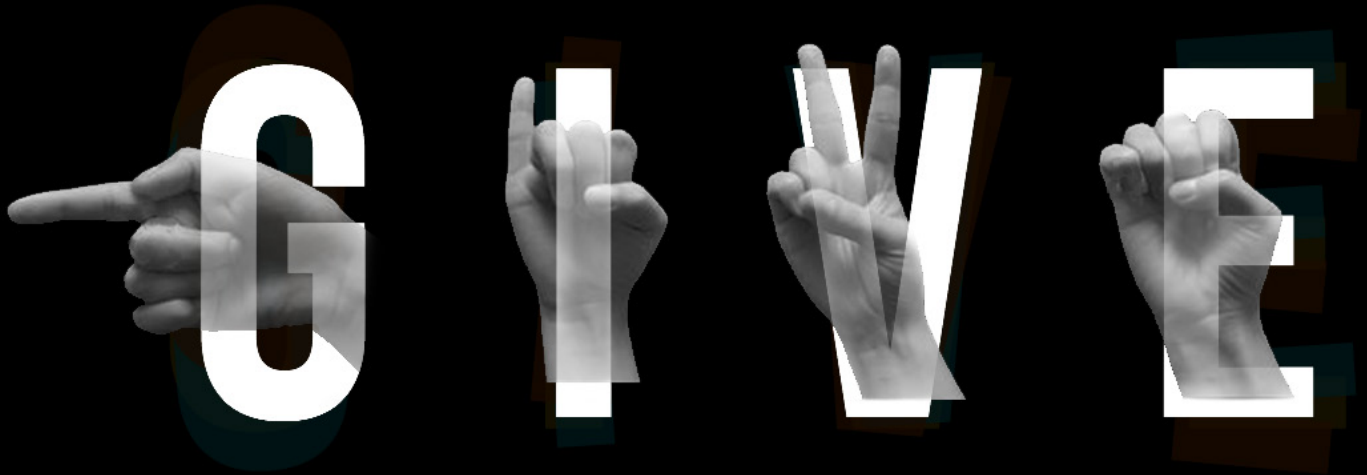
“Prepare and encourage communities to be supportive of one another in an inclusive way, including of persons with psychosocial disabilities, during the COVID-19 outbreak. This is especially important since mandatory quarantine, home confinement, and information overload may result in heightened states of distress,” they advised.

They urged governments to ensure practical support for PWDs such as obtaining food and supplies for people with psychosocial disabilities who may be unable to leave their homes due to quarantine or experience difficulty with leaving home during this period of heightened concerns about contamination.

As the different nations, including Uganda, put in place 14 to 21-day quarantine measures, the committee implores them to be flexible.

“Consider flexible mechanisms to authorize people with psychosocial disabilities to be able to leave their homes during mandatory quarantines, for short periods and in a safe way, when they experience particular difficulty with home confinement,” they held.





## Accessible Information A Must

When it came to communication, regarding COVID-19 they listed the WHO guidelines to governments on health information and communication:

- Include captioning and, where possible, sign language for all live and recorded events and communications. This includes national addresses, press briefings, and live social media.
- Convert public materials into an “easy read” format so that they are accessible for people with an intellectual disability or cognitive impairment.
- Develop accessible written information products by using appropriate document formats, (such as “Word”), with structured headings, large print, braille versions, and formats for people who are deafblind.
- Include captions for images used within documents or on social media. Use images that are inclusive and do not stigmatize disability.
- Work with disability organizations, including advocacy bodies and disability service providers to disseminate public health information.





## Group Delivers the Much-Needed Food to the Blind

When the country went into lockdown, PWDS felt abandoned and made sure it was known. In Mayuge District, the Twezimbe Lubu group started a drive to ensure the visually impaired got help. First, it was the food from the government, and next was a general appeal to any philanthropists to come to their rescue.

“It was hard before COVID-19, it is now even worse!” the group chanted on the streets. “If it is hard for you, imagine how terrible it is for us.”

The group committed themselves to deliver any aid collected, to people with visual impairment.

Their cries were heard, first by the local community, then by The Bible Society of Uganda.

“We have given back to over 100 blind people in Mayuge District. We gave food, soap, and other items to help them survive the COVID-19 lockdown,”

The Bible Society of Uganda announced. “The donation followed a public outcry that some visually impaired persons under their umbrella association of Twezimbe Lubu Group of the blind were going with food.”







## Bwanika Called Out for Help

Edward Bwanika, a single father of three with a hearing impairment was stuck at home without food. His children, two of whom also have a hearing impairment had no way of accessing learning materials. This father, a street food vendor in Kamokya, a suburb in Kampala, tried several options to no end.

Bwanika, an advocate for the rights of people with hearing impairment, reached out to Deaf Link Uganda (DLU) on behalf of people with hearing impairment in Kamokya. The organization which initially helped with skilling people with hearing

impairment had to go back to the drawing board to plan for relief food.

He told them that all the people with hearing impairment in his community lost their jobs. Quickly, DLU came up with a COVID-19 response project. They supplied food items and helped with reading materials for the children.

Upon the easing of the lockdown, they returned to make sure that Bwanika and the community of people with hearing impairment were back to work and gave them start-up capital.





## Coming Together for One of Their Own

When Jackson Okello's wheelchair got damaged, the people with disabilities came together and fixed it for him. The father of four, a shoe cobbler in Agago District had failed to leave the house in search of an income because of this. When he attempted to, he returned with bruises on his knees that required him to get a tetanus shot. "Normally he would have tried to raise the money to fix it himself, but he had not worked for months because of the lockdown and did not have money," Irene Laker, a volunteer VHT in Agago District said.

She said that the other alternative would have been to fundraise through the church but since churches are closed, Okello had to reach out to the people who understand his predicament. "He is always helping us, so we decided to help him this time around," Andrew Komagum said.

He said that Okello is an advocate for hard work amongst people with disabilities and would not have reached out if he wasn't genuinely stuck. "He has taught many of us how to repair shoes and doesn't believe in people with disability begging in markets," Komagum said.

Together with friends and family, they raised UGX 70,000 (about \$20) and fixed Okello's wheelchair. "We asked one of our sons to pass around an envelope and everyone contributed whatever little they had," Komagum said.

For a group of people that mostly lives on less than a dollar a day, this was great show of generosity. "We are happy that we could help each other even at a time when coronavirus had made it hard for us to meet and discuss our issues," he said.

Okello said that when the money was delivered, he broke down and cried. On top of the money, they had each added some food from their stores, some even sharing the maize flour that was given by the government.

"I know my people don't have much but seeing this gesture of solidarity made me very happy. May God bless them abundantly," he said. "We may not have much, but we have ourselves and these trying times have reminded me of that."





## Partially Blind Atude Sings about Coronavirus

In Kelim Village, a few kilometers outside of Kumi Municipality, Patrick Atude belts out into song about the novel coronavirus. Atude, the original composer of the Emaali song that was later re-done by Rachael Magoola is blind in one eye.

When the coronavirus was first announced, he took time off to understand the message and now sings some un-recorded songs on the virus at the trading center.

“He sings about why the local drinking joints aren’t allowed anymore and warns people about the dangers of continuing with the practice,” one of the locals, Harriet Akol said.

Going from home to home while playing his thumb piano, Atude, also a darling of the people in Kelim Village, has mastered the art of merging music and sensitization. He will be remembered for simplifying the government’s guidelines in song.



## Chapter 6

# Giving To Conserve Nature





A beloved gorilla called Rafiki was killed during the lockdown. Felix Byamukama was sentenced to eleven years in jail for the murder. Appearing before the Kabale Chief Magistrate's Court, he pleaded guilty to counts of illegal entry into a protected area, killing a gorilla, a bush pig, a duiker, and being in possession of bush pig and duiker meat.

This of course could not bring back Rafiki, the 25-year-old Silverback, a darling of tourists, that led the Nkuringo group of about 17 mountain gorillas. What this did however was remind the world that as we withdrew back to our homes, our friends in the wild had been left unguarded.

According to New Vision journalist, Andrew Masinde, <https://www.newvision.co.ug/news/1521155/covid-19-wwf-donates-sh20m-rhino-fund-uganda> the COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on the tourism industry due to the travel restrictions as well as a slump in demand among travelers. The United Nations World Tourism Organization estimated a global loss of up to \$30-50 billion this year alone.

In Ugandan, the \$1.6billion revenue and over 2 million jobs both directly and indirectly, have been affected. This however does not begin to describe the dent this has caused on conservation efforts. While attention was drawn to Rafiki's gruesome murder by poachers looking for a meal, experts worry many more of the wildlife species have been killed.

With this in mind, a group of philanthropists through the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) Uganda donated UGX 20million (\$5400) to the Rhino Fund Uganda (RFU) to support the Rhino sanctuary during this COVID-19 crisis. Both black and white rhinoceros breeds are globally endangered, and a single death would impair

strides to re-populate the species.

Angie Genade, the Executive Director for RFU said that they needed help paying rangers to ensure day to day safety of these animals. "This donation will help to bridge our funding gap caused by circumstances beyond our control. This way the rhino conservation can be maintained for the benefit of the local communities and the people of Uganda," he said.

David Duli, Country Director for WWF stated that COVID-19 is having an impact on wildlife. He explained that great apes, of which seven species are already threatened by extinction, are potentially vulnerable to this new virus. He explained that the lockdown and the loss of tourism revenue also create challenges for protecting wildlife.

"Conservationists are now calling on the Government and private businesses to help expand existing protected areas and improving their management as well as establishing new protected areas," he said.

Particularly, for the Rhinos, Duli emphasized the need to improve security monitoring to protect rhinos from poaching and the need to improve local and international law enforcement to stop the flow of rhino horn and other illegal wildlife trade items from Africa to other regions of the world.

"Rhinos has been an integral part of the natural world for tens of millions of years, and humankind is causing dramatic declines in just a few decades. We can change the outcome," he urged.







## A donation in Memory of Rafiki the Gorilla

In memory of the fallen ape, Rafiki, a group called 'Friends of Rafiki' donated food items to the staff in the Nkuringo area. They were delivered by Lydia Nandudu, the Director of Nkuringo Bwindi Gorilla Lodge and Nkuringo Walking Safaris and received by Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA).

They were distributed among a total of 119 staff (44 for Nkuringo and 75 for Rushaga). Each member of staff received 20kgs of posho, 10kgs rice, 10kgs beans, 5bars of soap, 4litres of cooking oil, and a pair of gumboots.

While delivering the items to Nkuringo Southern Sector office, Nandutu observed that the contribution was aimed at encouraging staff to continue fulfilling their mandate despite the drop in revenue as a result of coronavirus pandemic.

"We are delighted to contribute these items to the staff of Nkuringo who have always worked tirelessly to protect and conserve wildlife especially the mountain gorillas. This support is extended to them so that they keep up the great work of protecting the park amidst the pandemic of COVID-19," she noted.

John Justice Tibesigwa, the Senior Warden Southern Sector Bwindi Impenetrable National Park, thanked the 'Friends of Rafiki' for supporting UWA staff in their effort to conserve wildlife. He said that the items would go a long way in enabling staff in the Nkuringo sector to carry out their duties of protecting the Park and its invaluable resources, especially the endangered mountain gorillas, during these unprecedented times of the global pandemic of COVID-19.





## Ten Months' Allowances for the Rangers

A donation to the tune of \$100,000 was made to the Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA) by Pilgrim Africa. The organization said this money would go towards supporting rangers in Bwindi Mgahinga Conservation Area for a period of 10 months.

It would specifically be used for the ranger's allowances and operational activities of the conservation area to carry out routine patrols as well as monitor the health of the gorillas at a time when the revenues have dropped.

The cheque was handed over to Uganda Wildlife Authority Executive Director (ED) Sam Mwandha by the Board Chairman Pilgrim Africa Dr. Ben Khingi and Patron Lt. Gen Charles Angina at UWA Head Office on 17th July 2020.

While receiving the cheque, UWA ED Sam Mwandha thanked Pilgrim Africa for donating the money for the good of conservation of wildlife at a time when communities are getting desperate and poaching could return.

Bwindi Mgahinga is a key conservation area because it generates more than half the total revenue Uganda Wildlife Authority gets from all national parks and therefore needs adequate protection as a high priority zone.

Dr. Khingi observed that national parks were a

great economic asset to the country and that it is critical to protect them for the generations to come.

"We are aware that the halt to tourism income caused by COVID-19 has pushed many people who depend on tourism into poaching the very animals the industry depends on. Statistics indicate that cases of poaching in February and May more than doubled this year compared to the previous year of 2019," he observed.

He said that UWA's commitment to keeping the apes safe had inspired the donation. "When we learnt that UWA is ensuring rangers spend more time with gorillas to lessen the chance that they could wander off and be poached, Pilgrim Africa was greatly motivated to get involved."

Lt. Gen Charles Angina thanked UWA for the management of national parks. He acknowledged the serious damage COVID-19 has had on Uganda's tourism and noted the challenges that conservation grapples with given the reduction in resources for operational activities.

He reiterated that Pilgrim Africa seeks to make a difference through assisting wildlife management because wildlife is the oxygen that drives tourism and cannot be ignored.





## Protecting Karamoja's Giraffes

Despite a strict curfew, poaching during the lockdown increased. A group of giraffe enthusiasts under the organization Giraffe Conservation Alliance (GCA), raised UGX 30 Million (\$8,100) and donated it to the Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA). They asked that the money specifically go towards the giraffe monitoring activities in Pian Upe Wildlife Reserve and Kidepo Valley National Park. The goal is to support the rangers to carry out routine patrols as well as monitor giraffes around their home range to mitigate poaching. The cheque was handed over to Uganda Wildlife Authority Executive Director, Sam Mwandha by the Project Coordinator Isaac Mujaasi, at UWA Head Office on 1st July 2020.

Mr. Mwandha noted that UWA had intensified its efforts to patrol the protected areas as poaching incidences had increased since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic in March. "Poachers thought UWA had been locked down as well and its operations closed, but now that they

have realized that we are not. UWA is carrying out even more patrols and law enforcement, hence the poaching incidences have reduced," said Mwandha. He said that the support from GCA would also go towards sensitizing communities around the parks.

Mujaasi in his remarks said it was indeed important to support monitoring activities of the giraffes as they are endangered, and any further loss would easily render the population extinct. "UWA needs to maintain all their staff to monitor giraffes and other wildlife species in the conservation areas and its neighborhood," Mujaasi noted. "Issues of encroachment and poaching continue despite the lockdown, therefore, we need to, support efforts aimed at curbing threats to wildlife in addition to community awareness, education, and empowerment."

## Help for the Orphaned Chimps

Ngamba Island, home to about 50 orphaned and confiscated chimpanzees, rescued from the illegal pet and bushmeat trade found itself in need of help during the lockdown.

“We call upon everyone to support us during this trying time of COVID-19 pandemic that has affected the operations of Ngamba Island Chimpanzee Sanctuary,” they said. “The operations of Ngamba Island have been dependent on 70% of tourist revenue which is at a standstill in the entire world with travel bans in different continents.”

The sanctuary had been left with limited income to further their operations and was worried about the fate of the apes. “Despite their initial trauma,

chimps living at Ngamba have a safe and semi-natural environment in which to recover and eventually thrive over their long lives of up to 60 years,” they explained. “We can’t do this alone, but we believe together we shall be able to save and protect this endangered species in our care.”

They reminded the public that any kind of support was welcome. “Donations can be delivered to our office in Entebbe - Uganda or cash contribution can be either through mobile money, Visa, Master Card, American Express through the below button,” they said. Over UGX 22 million (about \$6,000) has been raised and the campaign is still on-going.







## Tents for the Game Rangers

Rangers on patrol in the national parks received a donation of operation gear from friends of nature, through the African Wildlife Foundation (AWF). The items included 100 heavy-duty single person tents, 300 gumboots reinforced with steel material, 300 safari sleeping pads, 300 metallic water bottles, 400 small size hand sanitizers, and 2,000 masks.

At the event hosted by the Uganda Wild Life Authority (UWA) on July 27, 2020, the AWF Executive Director, Saudi Bamulesewa noted that due to the current COVID-19 threat, they noticed the need for more tents as the single person tents donated are not shareable.

“These are single person tents tents, to avoid any disease spread but also avail the rangers

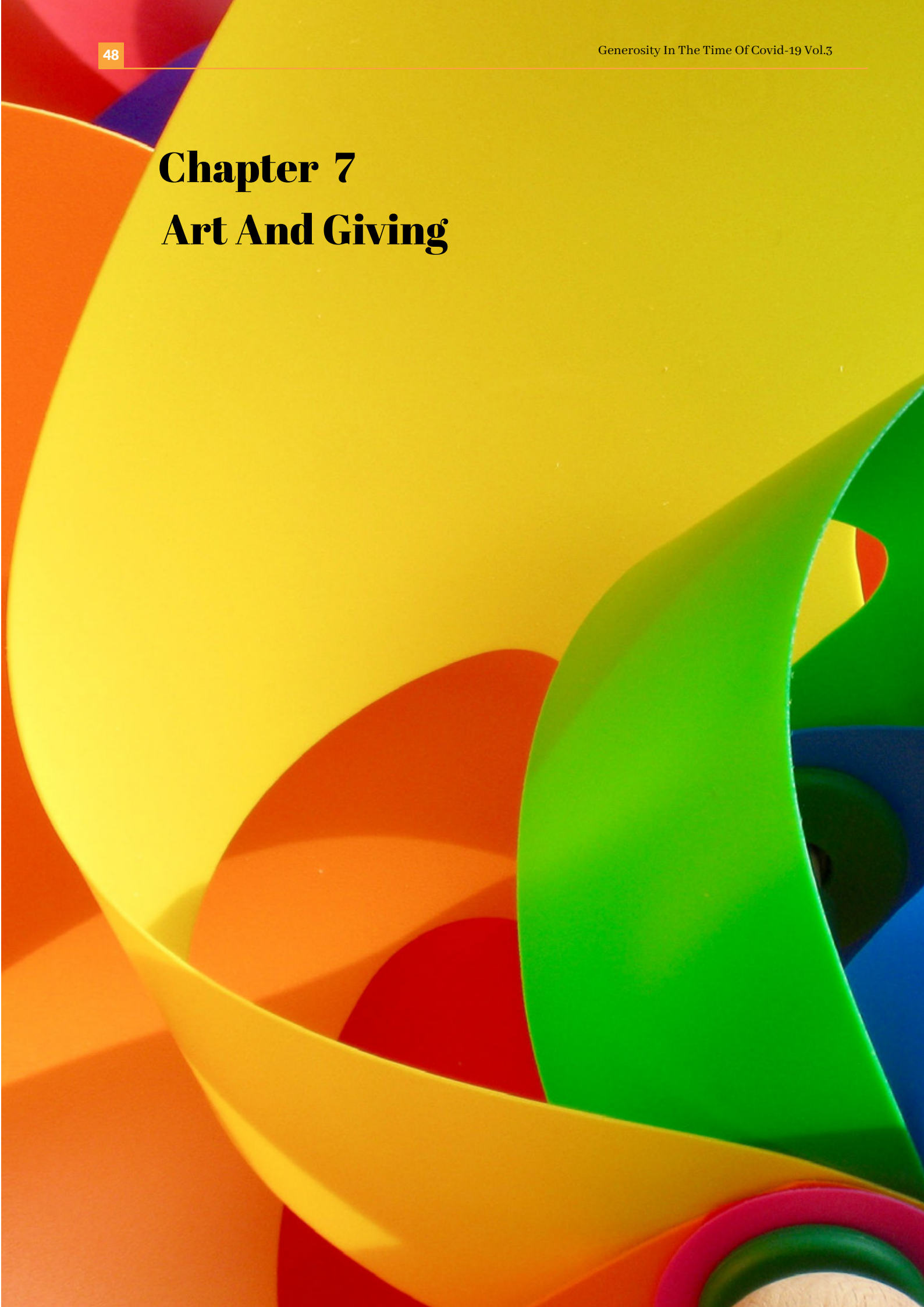
with a decent and comfortable place in the night as they go about the protection of the national parks during these unprecedented days of the coronavirus pandemic. The gumboots will offer effective protection of staff during the patrols and can last longer because they are reinforced with steel,” he said.

The Executive Director of UWA, Sam Mwandha thanked them for the help extended especially during the uncertain time of COVID 19 pandemic. “The sleeping pads will be a great motivation to our rangers on patrol especially in the rainy and cold days,” he said. “I wish to extend our gratitude to AWF for coming through for UWA in dealing with the current challenges where resources have significantly reduced due to the drop in the revenue collected.”

## The Healing Power of Art

When the Independent Magazine broke the story of how visual artist, Rashid Abdhufatah is using art to raise awareness on COVID-19 in Kampala, veteran artist, Nuwa Wamala Nyanzi applauded him. <https://www.independent.co.ug/telling-the-covid-19-story-through-visual-art/>

He noted that art is a strong mode of communication and possibly the best for the ghetto people who are often left aside.

Nyanzi also told the magazine that visual art is one of the oldest means of communication possibly second to spoken words referring to the biblical teachings in Exodus chapter 31.

He further explained that murals attract attention as they touch the heart to explore human emotions of love, longing, celebration, and concern. This makes it difficult for anyone to pass by without noticing it. It goes without saying that that Nyanzi himself has done several illustrations on paper regarding

COVID-19. Some were simply transcribing several messages which have been coined by health officials and socialites including the famous “tonseemberera campaign” among others.

He said many of these illustrations are making rounds on social media. The veteran visual artist said that most of the coronavirus campaigns might not be in one’s mother tongue given the multilingual society, but illustrations communicate in all languages.

He believes that over time, visual arts have had positive benefits in healthcare and have been part of several health campaigns. He adds that in this time of crisis and isolation, the role of visual art and art as a whole is becoming more central to the lives of many.

“Go to the hospital and see. The health experts long ago noticed that visual arts are important in society,” he said reflecting on words of famous Spanish painter Pablo Picasso who argued that art washes away from the soul, the dust of everyday life.





## Musicians Give

Asked what he was going to do for his country during the pandemic, singer Alexander Bagonza, better known by his stage name, A Pass said his art. True to his word, the crooner released music sensitizing masses about the virus both locally and internationally.

While some artistes recorded songs sensitizing masses, others organized virtual concerts to keep their fans 'sane' during these tough times. Outside of the Nile Breweries live concerts, several artistes used their social media platforms to entertain fans.

Singer, Vyper Ranking, real name, Ayiire Saddam,

used his concert to sensitize the public about the virus. He combed the guidelines by the Ministry of Health, using every interlude to remind his fans to sanitize and keep a social distance. "This disease is not simple, I love you all so much, so keep safe and alive," he cautioned his fans.

As Ranking sensitized fans, singer Remy Soda's song dubbed, Corona Virus Go consoled and unified Ugandans in Rwanda. Until recently, many Ugandans could not return to the country. "I am glad that my music can give you comfort during these hard times," Soda noted.





## More than Art

He is one of the religious leaders that have maintained that safety of the public should be prioritized over opening of places of worship.

As an artiste, he has used his platform to remind people to follow the Ministry of Health guidelines on COVID-19. Singer and Pastor, Wilson Bugembe has been nothing short of exemplary during the lockdown. First, he donated food relief to Wakiso RDC to help the needy

survive through the COVID-19 crisis lockdown. Before this, he had made personal donations to the needy in his community. After that, he mobilized his congregation at Light The World Church Ministries.

Together they donated different food items and necessities. The items which included rice, loaves of bread, matooke, posho, cartons of salt, and bars of soap. They were donated to those who could not afford a meal

a day. After this donation, he also reached out to the deejay association that is headed by DJ Nimrod and gave them \$ 1,000. Bugembe will also be remembered for imploring landlords across the country to be kind to their tenants during this COVID-19 crisis.

“They don’t have money, everyone is struggling, please dear landlords, be kind and merciful,” he beseeched every beginning of month.





## Singers Jenneth and Peace donate

Singers Jenneth Prisca and Pam Peace donated 50 bags of Posho to the Gulu District's persons living with HIV/AIDS and Persons with Disabilities (PWDs).

The duo worried that many people living with HIV/AIDS and PWDs had been forgotten during the lockdown.

"I know among those communities I have fans and I would like them to know that I am thinking about them," Prisca said.

Peace echoed that, "This is the time for us to give back to the people who pay to come to our concerts and buy our music."

Both singers implored fellow artistes to give back to their fans in these trying times. "

These people never ask for much from us, they simply support us, instead of us also lining for help, let us give back to them," Peace said.







## Visual Artist Ruganzo to the Rescue

As he drove through the vulnerable communities in Namirembe Village in Kiira Municipality, Bruno Ruganzu, a celebrated visual artist, knew he had to do something.

He realized that as the world preached social distance, there was a population that didn't have the luxury to do so. The stark reality is that keeping social distance meant going hungry for many, especially vulnerable families.

"Being a visual artist places me in communities like this so that I can best tell the stories," he said. "But the story was not good, these people were hungry, I had to do something!" Grateful that his work of art had collectors as far as Europe, Ruganzu decided to tap into those contacts. "When my friends both here and abroad

asked how I was doing, I said I needed to help my community," he recalls.

This was how the celebrated artist started a fundraising drive, which he took to his Facebook followers. "Soap and food distribution for 10 underprivileged families of 3-5 members in my neighborhood for two weeks during the lockdown," he announced.

He was quick to add that he hadn't done it alone: "I am grateful to my online friends and community that are supportive of my art and community. I see you Ana Bustamante, Will Clarke, Michelle Judice Witcher. Thank you to my neighbor, Den N, Savimbi, for the support in this critical time. I am because we are; Ubuntu."

When the government announced that anyone caught distributing food would be charged with attempted murder, Ruganzu together with friends, Denis Naturinda, and Abel Kugonza came up with an option.

"We got a local shop, gave them money for food items and a list of names from the community," he narrated. "Every two weeks for most of the lockdown, we would go back and pay for more food and ask the ten families to collect it."

To appreciate everyone that helped, Ruganzu said: "Gratitude for the amazing global Artists and friends who have been there for me and my community during COVID-19. Love is universal, I am because we are."







## Jonas Byaruhanga Dances to Break the Chains

His entry is mysterious. It is just sound and subtle movement, no words. When he starts to dance, however, the message is then conveyed. There is no doubt that renowned dancer Jonas Byaruhanga is talented. This dance routine created to express the burden of COVID-19 on the people is magical.

Titled, 'Freedom, Break The Chains', the routine was featured in the Ubumuntu Arts Festival. According to the festival organizers, the piece is a metaphor for the apocalyptic times we are experiencing now under the added weight of the global COVID-19 pandemic.

He also used the same routine to add his voice to the global George Floyd Riots. Jonas

specifically challenges us to always remember our ancestors and heritage as Africans, no matter where we are in the world.

He has danced on stages across the world and been part of several dance festivals. Like he often does, he brought passion to this routine.

## Money For hospital in Kasese

Whilst taking a regional glance, CivSource Africa noticed that the Western Uganda District of Kasese continued to see more philanthropy happening. This is because of the floods that left many displaced and destroyed a lot of property.

Even as the private sector started to reach out to communities affected by the coronavirus-induced lockdown, many started with Kasese because of the double tragedy. For example, Absa Bank Uganda donated UGX30 million towards the purchase

of essential medical equipment and supplies for Kilembe Mines Hospital whose infrastructure was damaged during the floods.

“We are beyond saddened by the sheer destruction this disaster has caused to the people of Kasese District.

We, therefore, stand in solidarity with the hospital administration and community to jumpstart the rehabilitation process with this provision of much-needed relief to the Kilembe Mines Hospital,”

Annette Kiconco, Acting Retail

Director at Absa Bank Uganda told the press.

Absa bank learnt that the hospital had lost medical supplies like stretchers, wheelchairs, biomedical fridge, oxygen concentrator, patient monitors, beds, and mattresses.

“This is the third time that the hospital is facing a disaster of a similar scale and we appreciate the support we have received from Absa Bank Uganda, as we need all hands on deck to begin rebuilding,” said Mr. John Makombo, a key stakeholder at the district.





## Bukonzo Farmers Help Each Other

A group of farmers in the Bukonzo area, through their co-operative, Bukonzo Organic Farmers Co-operative, launched a Livelihood Security Fund (LSF), to help fellow farmers struggling with the direct impact of Covid-19 and extreme weather conditions.

During the lockdown, the co-operative supported farmers with relief food items. Sadly, the

floods hit and again the co-operative had to help farmers who had lost crops and whatever little food they had stored.

“The Fund is in place to help sustain businesses and support income levels, but in the first instance, we must respond to basic needs. In the case of Bukonzo, this meant providing food and shelter for farmers, and additional support for pregnant

women and children. Some have lost everything in the floods and are sleeping in schools and churches,” the co-operative management said.

They said that before Bukonzo members can begin to rebuild their farms, general wellbeing is of utmost importance as they now have both the COVID-19 threat and the water-related diseases caused by floods.







## Taking Services to Patients on Lockdown

During the lockdown, Bwindi Hospital made deliberate efforts to take essential drugs to vulnerable patients in 101 villages in the Bwindi and Kigezi area.

“A team of 6 nurses goes out to the community every day so that the vulnerable patients can keep receiving the care they need,” the management said.

To ensure that more people were reached, the hospital introduced weekly outreaches. “During the weekly outreaches, over 70,000 people are reached and services extended closer to the people.

This helped reduce travel expenses because many patients were traveling from as far as 88km.”

During the community visits, they also offered referrals of mothers with risky pregnancies from their villages to the hospital.

These mothers were picked up from the community using the hospital ambulances for treatment at Bwindi Hospital.







## Meet the Student Keeping the Debate on COVID-19 Alive

When news of the virus first broke, Patrick Asaba, a third-year student of Clinical Medicine at the Kampala International University, wondered how he could help spread the message. He found a solution. Through Timeless Mission, a student-based organization where he is president, he decided to hold debates around the coronavirus. It also helped that the organization is built on public speaking, dialogues, writing, and poetry.

For months now, the assertive and passionate Asaba has been organizing thematic debates, dialogues, and poetry competitions on the

organization's WhatsApp group. This helps to spread the right information, sensitize and share ideas with fellow students, including those from other universities like Makerere, Kyambogo, Uganda Christian University, Bishop Stuart University, Mbarara University of Science and Technology, and Kabale University.

Speaking to the University's Publicity department, Asaba said that they had taken on a virtual approach to keep the conversation alive. "We choose participants who send in their submissions in form of voice notes on WhatsApp, and these are vetted by our judges who

then decide who the winners are," he explained the selection process.

When asked about the response, an elated Asaba said, "So far, the virtual debate has gone well because we have received submissions from people all over the country. Some of our KIU administrators like Dean of Students Western Campus, Maureen Asimwe, and Public Relations Officer Collins Kakwezi have participated in our discussions as well."







## Food for Nsajja Village

There was a call for help by a one Patrick Maylean from Fort Portal. He had seen the struggles the people of Nsajja Village had gone through since the coronavirus-induced lockdown was announced. He mobilized friends and reached out to those in the dire straits in this village in Kyenjojo District

“Everyone is hit by COVID -19 differently. With the current situation in the country and the world at large, I have teamed up with four more people to give a helping hand to the worst-hit people; those who have nothing to eat or hope of getting it

tomorrow,” he said.

Maylean and friends said that while the urban areas had their fair share of people struggling to stay afloat, they would start with the rural areas.

“As of now, we have managed to move to 10 homes in Nsajja Village found in Kyenjojo District and helped out with posho (maize meal), beans, and soap,” he said. “We teamed up to be able to gather more help for those starving. We could not look on while our people die of hunger.”

However, the relief was not

enough and now the group is imploring well-wishers to join them in their next food distribution efforts in the village. “With your help, however small, we can be able to reach more people. It can save a life, we highly appreciate you,” Patrick said.

Despite allowing vehicles back on the road, the group says that some families in Nsajja Village can barely get the day’s meal. Life as they knew it has changed, and they will need all the help they can get.







## Journalist Donates to the Elderly Alive

Duncan Twesigye's generosity knows no bounds. Better known as Ssalongo (father of twins) among his peers, the Kabale based Journalist's interest in helping the less fortunate precedes him. When the lockdown was announced, the kind-hearted journalist was touched by the despair birthed by the lockdown. He decided to do something about it.

He made a quick assessment of who was most affected by the lockdown and learned that though it cut across all groups, the elderly were struggling to get just one meal a day.

He donated relief food items to the elderly. He specifically reached out to the vulnerable elderly in a parish called Kyabahesi in Isingiro District. Using personal resources, he distributed 200 kilograms of maize mill (better known as posho) and several kilograms of beans. He also later gave out some money to those who did not get food.

Besides using personal resources to help, the journalist reported incessantly on the plight of the vulnerable. His reports were aired on Voice of Kigezi in Kabale, and this inspired

other philanthropic acts. He then called on fellow journalists to work together and ensure that they serve the vulnerable communities.

He pointed them towards the challenges arising from the outbreak of COVID-19 and its impact on the economy and other aspects of life.

"If we do this together, we can help many more families using our platform. People are going without food," Twesigye implored fellow journalists.

## Boost To Girls' Football Team

In the Eastern region, sports and philanthropy featured together quite often. Before the lockdown for example, a group of teenagers were excited about being part of a football team.

Working alongside Charles Obore, a passionate teacher from Teach Uganda, and philanthropist, Rev Charles Okunya Oode, The Mustard Seed Project established a girls' football team in Kumi District.

Footballs were delivered alongside shirts and boots as they rolled out the training and feeding programmes for the all-girl football team. Some of the girls even participated in the Global Goals World Cup in

Kampala earlier this year. For many of the girls who had never left Kumi District, this was a chance at exposure. Sadly, it was all cut short, and worse, back home, their families could barely afford the day's meal.

Together with the teacher and Reverend, the organization thought of a way to engage the girls and protect them from all the risky behavior that comes with being idle.

"During coronavirus-related school closures we secured funds for the girls to have a meal whilst they help to replant the vast football field," the organization's director, Sally Squires explained. "We are sponsoring this project

in the hope that our amazing girls will play in the World Cup one year!"

The other goal is to have a league level pitch before the next season and encourage the girls to train some more. "Sponsoring girls in this way enables them to stay in school through peer support," Squires said.

Interesting to note is that the girls are taught about their legal rights, how to avoid early marriage, and about the importance of education alongside their football training. "We will also be teaching them tailoring skills in order to provide a sustainable future," she said.

## Relief Food

Live sports were one of the activities that were postponed as they tended to attract crowds. To help keep the players afloat, football enthusiasts donated to the De School players and officials in Bugiri.

The relief items were distributed to players and staff members.

These included, posho 4 kg, beans 2 kg, sugar 1 kg, Soap 1 bar, and half litre of cooking oil.

Though this might have looked like a drop in the ocean, several other donations would soon follow with FUFA taking lead in ensuring the players, both senior and junior had a meal on their plates during the lockdown.





## Widows Deliver Food to Mudslide Victims

In Namisindwa District, mudslides left many people displaced and in dire need of help. The survivors had to seek refuge in relatives' homes. Upon hearing this, a group of women, most of whom are widowed, mobilized members of the community to give whatever food they could spare.

"They didn't ask for money. They wanted any food members had

to spare," Mercy Wamono, a volunteer social worker on the Village Health Team (VHT), said. Soon the women had collected an assortment of food items, from fresh maize cobs to maize flour; whatever the community had to offer, they took.

"The priority was those who were living with widowed relatives or people with disabilities," she recalled. "Some people even gave

their chicken. It was very good to see this kindness."

Luckily, the Eastern Uganda maize mill giant, Elgon Millers Ltd, donated 30 tons of maize flour to Bugisu Region to help in the fight against COVID-19. The food was distributed in the six districts of Bududa, Manafwa, Namisindwa, Mbale, Sironko, and Bulambuli to help needy communities.

## Sebei COVID-19 Taskforce gets a Cash Boost

The Sebei Elgon Co-operative Union donated UGX 15million (\$8,100) to the region's three districts of Kween, Bukwo, and Kapchorwa. They said that the money was to help in the fight against COVID-19.

Elisha Bureto, the union's Secretary Manager said that they would have given more but were still recuperating from the impacts of the virus.

"We would love to give more but this is what we have; we pray that it helps the Sebei districts fight COVID-19," he said. The money was directed towards community sensitization on the virus and acquiring more PPE for the frontline workers.

The items were received by the Kapchorwa Resident District Commissioner (RDC) and head of the District COVID-19 task

force, Emma Cherukut, together with the District's Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, James Owili Abiya.

Cherukut hailed the cooperative for its support saying it would help the district task force to address some gaps they faced in the fight against the pandemic.







## Masks for Nakatunya's Women Vendors

When an order was passed by the government demanding that every adult wear a mask, the question of affordability was raised by the public. Despite the government's attempt at distributing the much-needed masks across the country, many people still do not have them. With that in mind, philanthropist Sarah Inachu donated facemasks to women vendors in Nakatunya, a suburb in Soroti Municipality. Upon receiving hers, an elated

Esther Aisu said that the masks could not have come at a better time. She also said that many of the vendors had been using handkerchiefs before and that the masks were needed.

"We are just surviving. Life is not what it used to be. The customer numbers have dropped and sometimes food rots in our stalls. We don't have money to buy good masks," she explained. Another vendor said that some of them had been reduced to

re-using disposable masks for weeks on end, and yet these are not washable.

Peterson Oluka, a journalist, and resident of Soroti Municipality, celebrated Inachu's act of giving, and also implored others to do the same. "Giving is the key to success, fulfillment, prosperity, and a life of prosperity. When you give, you get. The world needs more people like her who give their all to aid the betterment of society," he said.

## Tataka Plastics Provides Face Shields

Had these been normal times, they would have been working on scaling up their machines to transform plastic waste into construction materials. Sadly, they are not.

Tataka Plastics, a northern Uganda eco-friendly social enterprise has channeled its efforts into a face shield to protect against COVID-19. The organization known for conducting community outreach programs to educate individuals about proper waste management practices in Gulu District has changed its goals to fit the current need.

“Due to the unforeseen challenges surrounding COVID-19, we are investing most of our time in supporting our community. We are making face

shields for healthcare workers and promoting social distancing in public places among other initiatives to help Gulu fight COVID-19,” John Okwero, an employer with the organization explained.

He said that their goal for 2020 is to scale up our recycling operation to create 30 local jobs and keep 9 tons of plastic waste per month from being burned in Gulu.

“We have been making wall tiles to sell to hardware shops and contractors, but when COVID-19 hit Uganda, we asked ourselves we could do to help our community” he narrated.

He further explained: “In the wake of COVID-19 in Uganda, businesses were put on hold

following directives by the government. The directives restricted any business besides those within the food industry and health care from being operational.”

Sadly, this led to the shutdown of such key stakeholders in our endeavor to recycle more than 9 tons of plastic waste in Gulu has to a great extent affected our day to day operations.

“However, our team has dynamically devised ways to turn our resources and expertise at Takataka Plastics to helping our community by providing protective face shields to front line medical workers as well as assisting in other community initiatives,” Okwero said.





## Larubi Didn't Forget People Living with Albinism

Disability rights activist, Robert Larubi's commitment to people living with albinism is admirable. When the country went into lockdown, and Northern Uganda, like all the other regions, was cut off, Larubi saw a looming crisis.

He knew that the people living with albinism had gone weeks without the much-needed sunscreen, and their delicate skin would soon develop blisters. Sadly, even when the President announced a gradual end to the lockdown, some districts like Gulu, remained in a state of emergency. Speaking to *The Irish Times*, Larubi said: "People were locked up in their houses, they were giving up."

Quickly, he got onto a motorbike and rode over 400 kilometers into villages in Gulu District.

Through his project dubbed The Rescue Mission, Larubi visited over 50 families of people living with albinism and donated the cream.

Despite the harsh sunny conditions, Larubi found many of the children working on family farms. "Their skin was burnt. One already had a lot of wounds on him. The chance of someone with albinism getting cancer in such conditions is very high," he said.

He also said that there are roughly 5,000 people with albinism in Uganda. This is a condition where someone is born with little or no melanin in their skin.

Besides facing stigma, this condition leaves them vulnerable to sunlight; this is difficult in a country like

Uganda, where temperatures are high.

Indeed, according to the World Health Organisation, because of this vulnerability, people with albinism are prone to developing skin cancer and visual impairment. Not only do they need consistent medical attention, but they must also use sunscreen and sunglasses to protect themselves.

Sadly, Larubi said that many people cannot afford the needed care. In regions like Northern Uganda, which has the highest rates of poverty in the country, sunscreen is viewed as a luxury, despite being a necessity. When families are financially strained, like they were during the lockdown, sunscreen will be the least of their priorities.





## Food for the 88-Year-Old Ogole Battling Leprosy

Kamilo Ogole's battle with leprosy left him unable to do any garden work. Defeated, the 88-year-old set off for Kampala City, about 400 kilometers away. For a while, he managed to survive through begging for the day's meal on the streets of Kampala.

That was until the country suddenly went into the coronavirus-induced lockdown. A few days into the lockdown, a hunger-stricken Ogole thought he might find refuge upcountry where it was believed to be less strict at the time.

He begged an essential worker headed to his home district to drop him off at his ancestral home in Alekolwongo Village, Alebtong District. Little did

he know the rules applied everywhere, the whole country was under lockdown.

His married daughter, who was equally struggling to put food on the table would send her teenage daughter with a meal for him, but it was barely enough.

The 13-year-old only managed to deliver the much-needed food to her physically impaired grandfather a few days a week. The elderly Ogole was forced to sleep hungry multiple times in the months of April and May.

In June, when the mango season started, some neighbors dropped off ripe mangoes which was his food for days. Sadly, the season left as quickly as it came, and he was back to starving. This was the state in which River

Blue, a community organization, found him; weak and tired. They brought him food to last several weeks and promised to keep checking on him. "This food donation came as a miracle!" an elated Ogole said upon receiving it.

River Blue is an initiative by a group of individuals in Alebtong District in partnership with the Love Without Borders Foundation. Through this program, they sought to distribute food packages under a small project called the COVID-19 Emergency Relief Food. The packages were delivered to 70 of the most vulnerable families affected by the ongoing COVID-19 lockdown in Uganda.







## No Interest on this Group's Loans

In Nyadi Subcounty, a women's village saving group exempted single mothers, widows, and the elderly from paying interest on the loans offered.

Loyce Lekuru, a volunteer VHT in the community said that the group agreed waive the interest on loans when they saw how hard financial meltdown impacted single mothers and the elderly.

"Apart from waiving the interest,

the repayment terms were also eased from weekly payments to bi-weekly ones," Lekuru said.

The first to benefit were the elderly who were raising orphaned grandchildren and had lost a source of income. "For example, the first person they gave the money in July was a woman of 75 years old who is raising orphans alone," she said. "Instead of paying back the money every week, she has been

told to pay it every two weeks. This means that she has double the time to refund the money."

Besides that, the group also agreed to help each other weed their food gardens for free to avoid any other costs. "They drew up a weekly timetable for the weeding," Lekuru said. In their way, this group has managed to share.
